Large-scale U.S.-based financial frauds such as Enron and World-Com, as well as fraudsters like Bernie Madoff, have affected our global business environment, and even our daily lives. In fact, hardly a week goes by without some type of fraud-related story appearing in the news. However, many frauds, but not all of them, could be prevented if an effective system of internal controls were in place. While internal controls do not guarantee a problem-free business environment, a good control environment will reduce the risks as well as the negative impact associated with fraud, waste, and inefficiency. This course will explore the concept of internal control with some discussion on financial controls, but with additional exploration of systems controls. We will talk about white collar crime, computer crime, ethics, and the Sarbanes-Oxley (SOX) legislation. This is an overview course—not an auditing course and not an accounting course. Students who enroll should want to enhance their overall understanding of the terms and concepts related to internal control, internal auditing, and fraud. By the end of the semester, students should have a more comprehensive understanding of the need for businesses to have a good control environment. Swanson	English	<p>Authors David Ahlstrom and Garry Bruton define leadership as: "the act of guiding others toward the attainment of common goals or objectives." Leaders are those who significantly affect thoughts and behaviors, usually through encouraging collaboration as well as through persuasion and influence. As globalization has evolved so has leadership; however, in the business environment, the two entities have not necessarily evolved in tandem. Consequently, sought-after global leadership qualities, values, and competencies are changing at a rapid -- and, perhaps even unprecedented -- pace.</p> <p>In fact, one prominent source (Bloomberg) reported that in 2009, what companies valued most in leaders was "execution," the ability to achieve results. For 2010, that quality changed to "strategic thinking." For top leadership trends for 2011, Chief Motivation Officer David Lim reported that more organizations will be seeking leaders with the "right values," and first among them is the ability to promote continuously transparency and accountability.</p> <p>The overall objective of this course is to identify and explore those people, trends, issues, and events that have shaped and continue to shape this century's global leadership paradigm. We will examine how leadership differs from management as well as how the ever-evolving concept of "global leadership" differs from former definitions of the term. We will examine the so-called "right values" and garner a more complete understanding of the need for organizations to be transparent and accountable. We will explore the many facets of the individuals, events, and issues which have created this globalization phenomenon, and we will explore predicted future trends.</p> <p>For many students, the course will be a capstone one, a culminating experience embodying many disciplines learned to date. The focus of will be on tragedy; we will consider what tragedy is with a little reference to classical tragic drama and theatre customs. The three main plays, which will illustrate the development of English professional theatres of Elizabethan and Jacobean London, i.e.: between the 1590s and late 1610s, will be: Christopher Marlowe's Doctor Faustus, produced in 1592 around by the greatest English dramatist before Shakespeare; then, we will look at William Shakespeare's Othello, produced shortly after the crowning of James I in 1604; and, from a decade later, a play which foreshadows, four centuries in advance, both the psychological, spiritual and monstrous perversities of the horror genre, and the development of complex, intimate scenes and strong female characters: John Webster's classic, The Duchess of Malfi, ca. 1613-14. Students will be introduced to the language of Shakespeare and his contemporaries by looking at key-scenes in the original texts, and they are also encouraged, in their own time, to read the plays in Korean translation in their readers.
